


THE RIGHT ORDER














Pid you know that the beaver was the most important animal for the fur industry in Canada? What we call the history of the fur trade?







It all started long ago, around 1534, at the time of Jacques Cartier



That's right. Subsequently, in 1625, Cardinal Richelieu planned the exploitation of furs. Fur of wild animals was extremely valuable and ships regularly left North America loaded with wild fur pelts



Puring the 17th and 18th centuries, the fur trade was a big part of the economic activities of North America. This trade was based on barter





That's correct. A few trading posts were established along the St.

Lawrence River, and later, along all major rivers and lakes. Aboriginals and merchants met there to exchange their goods





Then they had to transport the pelts by canoe up to a trading post to trade with Europeans. This is where Aboriginals received goods in exchange for their fur





Finally, Europeans sent the pelts to Europe

Beaver pelts were the most in demand because felt hats were very fashionable in Europe. Beaver fur was perfect for the making of these hats



The fur trade became very popular, for both Aboriginals and the "Coureurs des bois" - the first non Aboriginals trappers. Unfortunately, this intensive trapping resulted in a serious reduction in the number of beavers





It was a little like the trapping license today?

Yes. Trapping is a well-regulated activity to ensure that we can harvest furbearers in a sustainable manner!

Several years later, the fur trade continued to expand everywhere in North America



Pifferent clothes and decorations called "trim". Everything was sewn by hand with large needles



























No. We simply have to make sure that the furs are scraped and dried properly. Then, when done, we must remove all staples and nails










THE RIGHT PATH A








